teers to act out ways of hanging laundry, Christmas ornaments, etc. to introduce the theme for the week. We loved singing along with the upbeat music. Every



night we had a discussion of the day’s events and how it ties into our lives back home.

Our group was split in half with everyone getting a leg up in the world. One team went to the house on the hill and painted and painted. We got up on ladders to build a porch with a roof. The Youth Group has been running the **Can and Bottle Fundraiser** for the past 3 summers. The money is used to pay for gas to drive to Philippi, West Virginia where we work on a mission project.

It takes 38 gallons of fuel to get us the 575 miles to Philippi, West Virginia. So, for every 65 cans/bottles that we received, we can buy one gallon of gas. At \$3.25 a gallon we will need about 2,500 cans to take us from Connecticut to West



Virginia and another 2,500 to get us back. Every can counts, so we continue to ask that if you have any empty cans and bottles lying around at home, please bring them to church and

help support our summer mission trip. There is a marked container in the conference room to place your donations and a youth has signed up to be responsible for returning the cans.

- *A Word from the Pastor*

I am wrestling with a bit of a dilemma as I write this article. This newsletter is for the months of October, November and December. Is October too early to write something about Christmas? Yesterday the temperature rose to over 90 degrees. Is it too warm to write something about Christmas? How do people in Florida do it? To borrow a line from Bob Dylan, "The answer my friend, is blowing in the warm wind" and the answer is no it is never out of season to think about the God who created the universe coming to earth in human form so we might understand divinity better and know forgiveness and grace. And the things we associate with Christmas such as peace, love, hope and joy should never be packed away in the attic or basement.

Just yesterday there was an article in the Hartford Courant titled "Retailers Roll Out Christmas." It seems that Sears, Target, Home Depot, and Walmart are thinking like me. One spokesperson said, "Based on what we're seeing, the numbers indicate that our customers are purchasing their holiday décor products earlier." I wonder if that is because the items are in the stores earlier.

There are two thoughts I want to share with you. First, as we see the halls being decked, and the store aisles filling with Christmas candy and decorations, remember that the way to truly celebrate Christ's coming starts on the inside and works its way outside. It begins in our hearts, in our relationship with God through forgiveness, and gratitude and works its way out to our actions. My second thought is that sometimes when we start the Christmas celebration in October we grow "tired of Christmas" long before December 25th arrives. How can we grow tired of Christmas? By celebrating it the wrong way, by celebrating it on the outside, but not truly on the inside, in our hearts. There needs to be a balance between this inner and outer celebration and I believe that when the outer celebration becomes more important than our inner Spirit celebration then we grow tired of Christmas.

In Matthew 23 we find some of Jesus' hardest words. They are directed towards the religious leaders who opposed Him at every turn. But Jesus saw through the facade of their religious actions and looked at their hearts. In verses 25-27 he tells them... "Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You clean the outside of the cup and dish, but inside they are full of greed and self-indulgence. Blind Pharisee! First clean the inside of the cup and dish and the outside will also be clean. You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of dead men's bones. In the same way, on the outside you appear to people as righteous, but on the inside you are full of hypocrisy and wickedness."

I want to apply these words to us as we begin to think about Christmas. Let's start our Christmas celebrations on the inside, in our hearts and Spirits, and let it grow out from there. And as the Christmas Season arrives, if you find yourself growing tired of Christmas, look at your heart and examine the balance of your internal and external Christmas celebration. If we begin celebrating more or longer on the outside than we are on the inside, we will become in danger of being worn out.

May you have a blessed Christmastide. And by the way, have a blessed Thanksgiving too.



Board of Trustees

It is vital that we have good attendance at our business meetings and we encourage you all to mark your calendars and bring a sandwich for lunch. The social committee will be providing soup, beverages and dessert.

After much consideration, based on the discussion of the Memorial Gifts Task Force Committee and the congregation at large, the Board will be making the following motion at the business meeting. The Board of Trustees is recommending the following policy on the acceptance of monetary memorial gifts. Sixty percent of the total gift will go into the church general fund, twenty percent will go into the undesignated memorial gifts fund and provide support for our ministry and allow us to have monies available for memorial gift purchases as deemed appropriate by the Memorial Gifts Committee as well as contribute to the long term mission of our church. Please feel free

to speak to the Trustees if you have any questions about this proposed policy. We encourage you to come to the **October 28th** Business meeting to discuss this important issue.

GUIDELINES FOR PROVIDING REFRESHMENTS FOR FELLOWSHIP HOUR



Sign up on schedule in Conference Room

Provide:

- Beverages (punch, cider, juice, hot chocolate, coffee, tea)
- Snack foods (vegetables with dip, popcorn, fruit, cheese & crackers, cookies, cake).
Your own special recipes are always appreciated.
- Paper goods - cocktail size napkins and plates, if necessary
Flowers (not necessary, but always a nice touch!)

Coffee is provided by the Social Committee and is in the kitchen by the coffee maker. Coffeemate and various sugars (white, Equal, Splenda) are also provided and are located in the kitchen on the turnaround under the counter by the coffee maker.

Plan to set up the Conference Room before the Worship Service begins. Use one or two large tables. Various plastic liners and lace tablecloths are available in the Conference Room closet next to the piano.

When the Fellowship Hour is over, remove all food items from the tables. Wash, dry and put away any dishes and/or utensils that were used. Wash out coffee maker and **throw away coffee grounds.** Please wipe off plastic liners with a clean, wet cloth and let them dry before folding them to put back in the closet. If the plastic liner is torn or cannot be thoroughly cleaned, **throw it away!** If you use the lace tablecloths, please take them home to wash on a **Gentle Cycle and return to the church the next week.** Also take home and wash any dishtowels that you used and return to the church the next week. **Please take all unused food items home with you.**
